EXECUTIVE ADDRESS by Chris Pilgrim

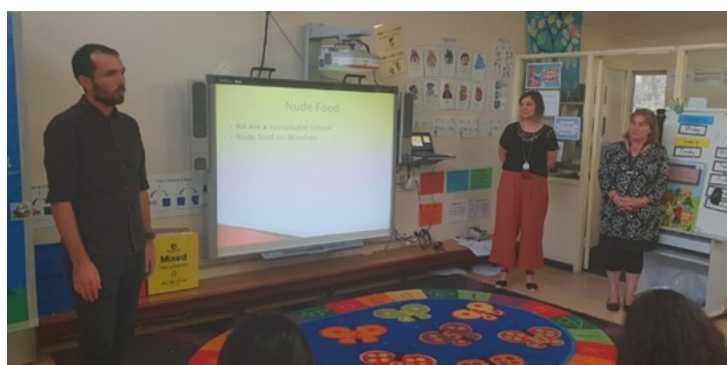
Welcome to Forrest Primary School, 2019!

Equity— Things aren't always equal because different children need different approaches.

Growth—A year's growth for every child. (We will tell you how we measure that growth as the year goes on).

Engagement of all students and all families—Are we engaged with you and are you engaged with us regarding your child's education? If not, contact the class teacher or contact me on the email listed above and we'll work out how we can do that better.

What we do to achieve Equity?

Here are some strategies:

- We run an **Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Culture Club** each Monday afternoon from 3:00—4:00pm. Parents are most welcome.
- **Reading Recovery** is a reading programme for six-year-old children who are not meeting benchmarks in Year 1. The 20-week, one-on-one programme is run by our early childhood literacy expert, Nicole Richardson.
- **Response to Intervention** programme (RTI also known as Learning Assistance) is run by Carmel de Graaff who works with groups of children across the school each week so that they become fluent and competent in reading, writing and maths.
- **English as an Additional Language or Dialect** programme (EAL/D) is for many of our EAL/D students and is enthusiastically run by Patricia Williams and Kylie Dorsett. Children are supported in English, usually in the classroom.

Did you know?

We have a special English conversation class for mums and dads and grandparents too. It's on Wednesday mornings from 8:30—9:00am. Your children can come too and read or play. It's run by 'Chris and Chris', aka Ms Pilgrim and Mrs Thambipillai. We'd love you to come. Soon we will have a special Devonshire Tea which was the idea of one of our adult English students!

- **Small Group Programme (SGP) – also known as the Learning Support Unit (LSU):** the Small Group Programme has only just begun and we are fortunate to have had a brand new facility built over the January holidays. There are currently 7 children with special needs in the programme which is run by Cara Tink-Evans and Theresa Pope.
- **Restorative Practice** is the way we keep relationships in good nick and it's the way we restore relationships when there's a breakdown. It means we have authentic conversations where everyone is heard and everyone has a voice. We make agreements about ways to move forward rather than focus on punishment.
- **Positive Education** brings together the science of Positive Psychology with best practice teaching and learning. Its ultimate goal is to enable people to live rich, full meaningful lives—that is, to flourish. The term flourish is about 'feeling good and doing good'.

Growth

We measure improvement—data is both quantitative or qualitative.

We provide work that suits the child. The curriculum has to fit with the child, not the other way around.

We work collaboratively in teams to compare and assess work samples.

- Great leadership
- Relevant, significant, stimulating Professional Learning
- Great classroom teachers

Leadership

Our leadership team has increased this year by one person. It won't always be this extensive but at present, in addition to our principal (Chris Pilgrim) we have:

- **two Deputy Principals**, Hayley Singh and Renee Berry
(If you were wondering why Hayley wasn't around in the first week of school, it's because she quietly married her beau, Sam, on New Year's Eve and then went to Europe for a honeymoon!).
- **two PYP Coordinators**, Jemma O'Brien and Kylie Dorsett
- **one data expert**, Candice Kingston
- **one literacy specialist**, Nicole Richardson, who is also our RTI coordinator, ICT coordinator and our community person
- we also have one **Business Manager**, Ann Hayres, who does everything for our school and who helps FOOHSC as well.

Great Teachers

I am unashamed to tell you that I only pick 'the best of the best' in terms of teaching staff.

We provide continual, high level professional learning that links to our PYP programme and our Annual Action plan. The teachers learn continuously; they are all committed life-long learners, and they are professionally challenged. Our staff survey results from 2018 were exceptionally high. This reflects the reality that our staff is happy; teachers love coming to work; they collaborate professionally; they socialise; they love what they do and they are totally devoted to your children.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) and Action

In the IB we bring hearts and minds together to make a difference in the world.

What that means is that we challenge children intellectually; we build their character and sense of responsibility to themselves, others and the planet.

We help them learn to take the threads of their learning outside of school to make the learning relevant and significant.

We all love the work we are doing at Forrest and none more than the Year 6 teachers who teach the children about working towards the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

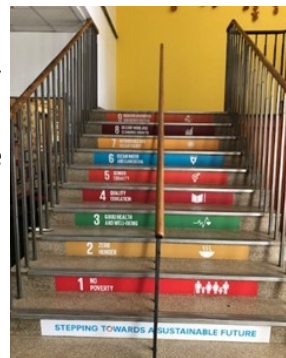
Upcoming Events

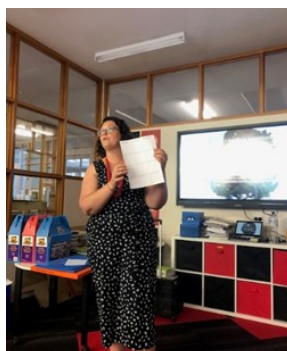
- **Sustainability** – this year we want all students to eat inside and bring nude food containers. This will reduce waste and help to keep our playground litter free.

From the PYP (Primary Years Programme) Coordinator, Kylie Dorsett

Thank you for your warm welcome back! It is lovely to be back in Canberra and back at Forrest primary school. Two years ago I took a job at The Scots School Albury as a curriculum leader to help them achieve authorisation as an IB world school. With that challenge complete, my family and I have returned to friends and extended family here in Canberra. I would like to say thank you to the Forrest Primary School community for the warm welcome we have received—it has been wonderful to see familiar faces and meet our new students and parents.

In late January, teachers returned to school and planned for the year ahead, working on Units of Inquiry, English and Maths. We also engaged in professional learning, exploring the new enhanced PYP, which has been developed in response to current educational research and feedback from PYP schools across the globe. Amongst other areas, we focused on:

- Agency—increasing student voice, choice and ownership
- The role of play in Early Years learning
- How to use the community to facilitate quality learning



Preschool 2019

Welcome to our beautiful new Preschool students, the Magpies and Kookaburras. What an exciting first week! Our Preschool teachers Rachel and Hayley, Preschool assistant Polly, and Deputy Principal Ms Renee Berry, really enjoying meeting all the new students and their families.



SCHOOL TRAFFIC

Keeping our students safe is always a top priority, and therefore we regularly remind people of the importance of following our drop-off and pick-up traffic arrangements.

Between 8:45am-9:10am and 2:55pm-3:15pm, there is to be no car movement in or out of the parking spaces in the long line directly in front of the school.

Senior and Junior School pick-up areas are designated with yellow line markings on the driveway. Please follow these line markings.

Children will only be able to board a car if it is sitting in the marked areas and will be assisted by either the teacher on duty or the parent helper. We ask that parents/carers do not exit their vehicles as this can slow down the traffic flow and there are repercussions for other motorists.

Children may only board the car once their car is the first two in the line.

Cars waiting need to form a line with minimal gaps to ensure the system runs effectively and traffic does bank up onto State Circle.

If a car enters the pick-up zone and the child isn't there, the driver will be asked to do a circuit of Hobart Avenue and re-join the line.

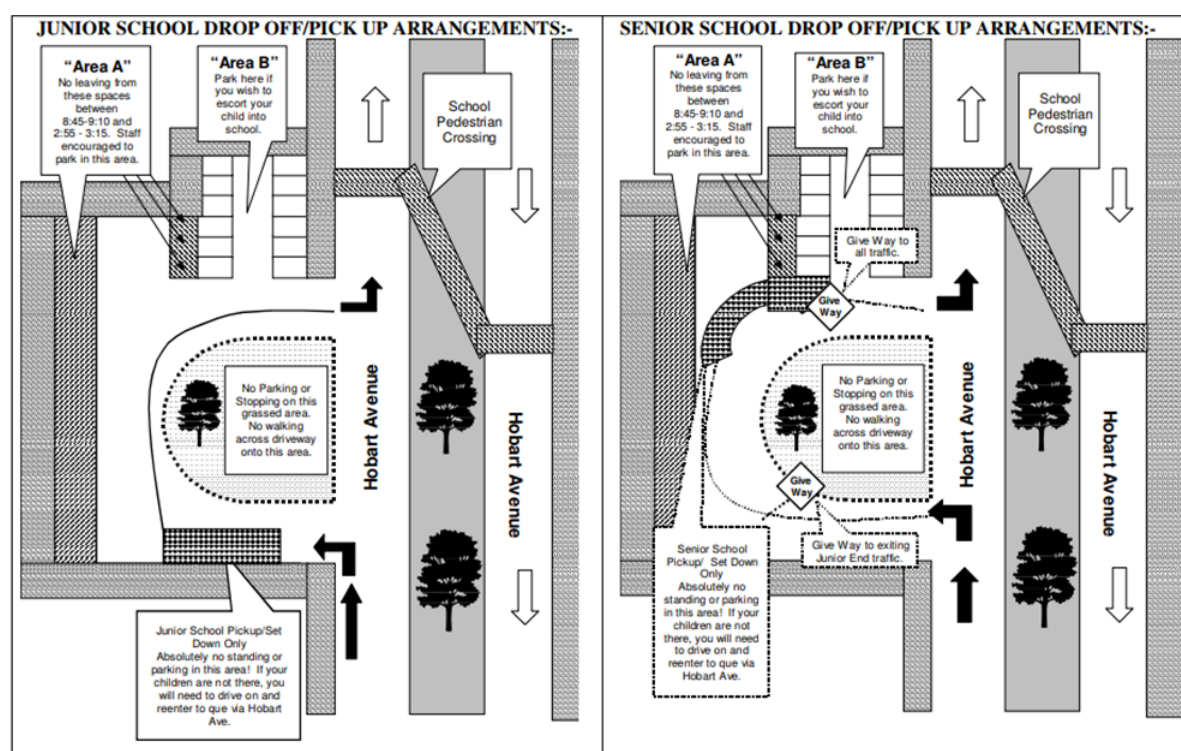
Families with both junior and senior students may direct their children to be picked-up at either area.

Children will be supervised, and seating will be provided. Children have been reminded to sit on the seats under the cover and not on the gutters or near the trees.

Teachers and parent volunteers will be on duty to assist with supervision.

Library Opening Hours

Borrowing Books

Students have a weekly library borrowing session and your child's classroom teacher will let you know which day.

Library Lovers' Week is 12-16 February. Encourage your child to read a story they love to you. You might like to read your favourite childhood story to your child too. Check your ACT Libraries for special activities for families in that week and we will also celebrate at school.

Chief Minister's Reading Challenge

Students are encouraged to read 15 books from any genre in library/class and home time during Terms 1-3. Class teachers will monitor the class reading logs for Preschool to Year 3. Students in Years 4—6 will receive an individual reading log during Term 1 to complete at home.

VOLUNTEERS

Any Parent, Carer or community member interested in volunteering at the school (e.g. canteen, home reading, library help) is invited to come to a Volunteers meeting over morning tea in the Library—date and time TBC. The Principal and a representative from the P&C will be present to explain the variety of volunteer jobs available. We will also discuss the requirements for the Working with Vulnerable People (WwVP) card.

The *Working with Vulnerable People (Background Checking) Act 2011* (the WWVP Act) commenced on 8 November 2012. It aims to reduce the risk of harm or neglect to vulnerable people in the ACT. The WwVP Act requires those who work or volunteer with vulnerable people to have a background check and be registered. It is free for volunteers and required if volunteers are working with children. To apply for the WwVP Card, go online to Access Canberra then in person to the shopfront to have your photo taken and show your 100 points of ID. If you have a card from interstate you still require an ACT WwVP card.

It has been a very positive and rewarding experience. The benefits from volunteering at school are numerous. It was, and continues to be, a wonderful opportunity to meet families (both across year groups and the wider school community) and to establish new friendships and networks with other parents/carers which I'm sure will continue throughout the years. These connections, particularly for those of us who don't have family in Canberra, can be an amazing support and a real lifeline. It's very reassuring to have a parent or two that you can turn to for help when you're running late, have an important meeting or just need a hand with school drop off/pick up, not to mention those memory-making play dates during the hols. It's also a great way to find out what's happening at school (as other parents/carers may be active in other areas of the school community).

Being a hands-on volunteer in the classroom can strengthen your relationship with your child. You can gain a much better understanding of how they spend their day, what they do i.e. their classroom learnings. This can help when trying to learn and/or talk more about school life and rather than ask 'How was school?' you can target your questions if you know about activities, friends names etc and hopefully you'll get will be more than a singular one word response 'good'. Your presence in the classroom/school can also help boost their confidence at school and help reinforce their learning's at home reinforces that you care about their education and how important it is. I'd even go as far as saying it can make your child's day more exciting and enjoyable (though this may not always be the case as our juniors get older and parents/carers become an embarrassment LOL)! how they interact with their friends & classmates and it's also a lovely opportunity for you as a parent/carer to get to know the other children.

Volunteering helps establish and cultivate a real sense of community. It sets a great example for our children to see us all working together, cooperatively, to improve the school environment by helping to raise funds to fund up-grades and better facilities around the school & learning tools & resources, and most importantly provides some

valuable 'hands-on' assistance to the wonderful staff who do such an amazing job with our children during their learning journey. Helping your class teacher with small tasks (sharpening pencils, covering books, sorting permission slips, etc.) frees up their time so they can spend more face-to-face time with students educating.

Many parents I have chatted with often say they don't feel they can volunteer because they're time poor or don't have the necessary skills to help. The good news is that there are heaps of different ways you can become involved and opportunities will pop up throughout the year so it's never too late to put your hand up - who knows you may even learn a new skill (I've mastered the Eftpos machine though I'm still a novice when it comes to the 'art' of disassembling a marquee!). Volunteering—you get back more than you give!

CULTURE CLUB

The Culture Club began on Monday with afternoon tea for families. It is held in the library from 3:00—4:00pm. We thank the P&C via FOOSHC for providing the afternoon tea and Community One for providing the bus transport home for the students. In partnership with parent and community volunteers and staff, we aim to deliver an arts, literature and environment based program to support our Indigenous students to connect with their culture, heritage, language and the local Ngunnawal history.

Forrest Out of School Hours Care

It is with much excitement and great pride we announce that Forrest Out of School Hours Care (FOOSHC) has been awarded the Excellent rating by ACECQA. FOOSHC is the first in the ACT and the fourth OSHC in Australia to be awarded this Excellence rating.

As you may be aware, the Excellent rating is the highest rating a service can achieve under the National Quality Framework and is a testament to our services' exceptional practices and programs. The awarding of our services' Excellent rating has been announced on the ACECQA website. This is a significant achievement and acknowledges the exceptional standard of education and care Forrest Out Of School Hours Care is providing, and its commitment to improving outcomes for children and families.

The team applied for this rating in December and had to be assessed against and satisfy the criteria to be awarded the Excellent rating. The process was vigorous & intense and consisted of

- a 200-page application evidencing the above criteria which included supporting statements, evidence from action research, film clips of our practices, interviews with relevant stakeholders and other necessary documentation;
- previous assessment and rating report (in order to apply for the excellence rating, services must have received "Exceeding" in the assessment rating process)
- supporting report from our regulatory authority – (CECA the people who ensure our ongoing compliance to the National Law and Regulations)
- 2.5 hours teleconference conducted by ACECQA officer

A huge congratulations to the FOOSCH team, Ali, Kylie, Carl and of course ex staff member Molly and to all the staff for this amazing result and the hard work and long hours put into the submission.

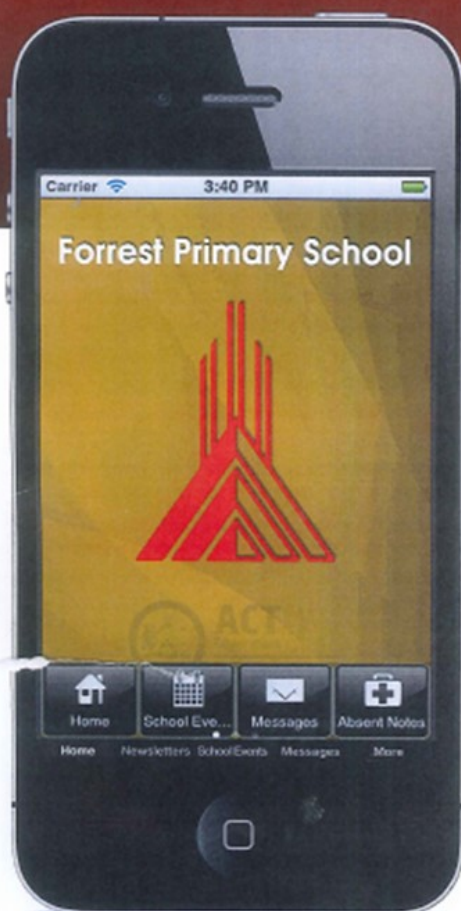
Welcome BBQ

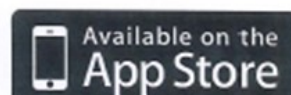
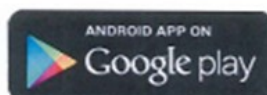
AGM

In this way we, staff and community members have the opportunity to give back to the school, meet new people, socialise at all stages of planning and implementation of the events and have fun whilst working for a common goal.

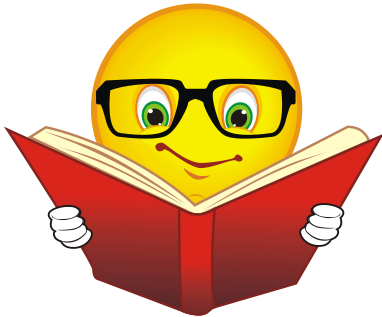
Our first meeting for 2019 is on Tuesday 19 February at 8.15am in the library. Children are most welcome to attend with a parent/guardian.
